

Committees in K'maido at work



Stakeholders in Kabera-maido are now playing their different roles. These include Child Protection Committee (CPC) members and School Management Committee (SMC) members. This positive change was as a result of trainings on their roles.

The CPCs were trained on the recording and reporting of child abuse cases; Eteu Julius the vice chairperson LC I Apili village confessed that he was unable to record child abuse cases in the past, but after the guidance he received with his committee members from the CDO and

PO, he was able to record 3 child abuse cases in the month of August 2020.

Meanwhile, the SMC were trained in resource mobilisation. A case in point is Kamuk parents who planted 1 acre of beans and harvested 100kgs, Aturigalin Primary School harvested 250kgs of maize, Okapel PS got 300 kgs of maize, St Simon PS 200kgs of maize and Achilo Corner PS got 120kgs of maize.

They have already cleared the gardens for this season; the harvested foods will be stored to boost pupils feeding when schools re-open.

CCMP trainings benefit communities

Three Baptist churches of Maguluka, Kyamukama and Luwanga were trained in relationship building. The training was focused on the story of the Good Samaritan; Luke 10:25-37 and Luke 10:25-37 about the good neighbour.

This training was aimed at facilitating the church to understand the biblical perspective for relationship building with its immediate community and prepare to engage the community

in a formal manner.

In another training on resource mobilisation, members were able to identify all the God given resources around them. These were categorized into 7 categories which include: social, human, economic, physical, spiritual, natural and time was also identified as a basic resource. This helped members to understand that they have great resources that they can use to come out of poverty.

The mobile court that was conducted on 11th and 14th August led to the settling of 9 cases thus encouraging community members to report cases. The court was organised in partnership with different partners such as the police, Sub counties and the Probation officer among others and it was presided over by grade one magistrate, Resident State Attorney and advocates.

Additionally, 40 caregivers were successfully trained on making of local play materials for children. The caregivers made materials out of bottle tops, plas-

tic bottles, newspapers, boxes, plywood and others. This skill is intended to help caregivers to have enough local play materials and learning aids when the school term opens. The caregivers made work plans to ensure that the same skill is passed on to the children through the community children clubs for sustainability.

Under CEA, 900 farmers under the Abim West Farmers' Network (ABWEFAN) received soya and bean seeds as a result of a partnership with CARITAS and NUJOK. The farmers who were from Lotuke, Awach and Mo-



rulem each got 10 Kilograms of soya and beans seeds. This was aimed at boosting the nutritional bit of the CEA project in Abim.

The farmers also received a training from NARO and NABUIN on how to improve the quality

of the three value chains of millet, maize and sorghum. In this meeting, the small holder farmers were advised on issues of weather changes and water harvesting as preparedness against the effects of climate change.
